

President's Message

September 2019

Our annual fall Tin Lizzie Tour-**A trail and Two Rails for Santa Fe**- is planned and set for September 18-22. To my knowledge the club has never had a tour to Northeastern New Mexico including the Raton and Clayton areas. Dave Ferro, selecting the above title for the tour, incorporated two of the economic forces in the development of this beautiful area of our state-**Railroads and the Santa Fe Trail**. Ranching and mining are two other major economic forces at play. We will have a private tour of the superb Raton Museum with the director and a tour of the historic Shuller theater on Raton's main street.

Near Folsom, NM 30 miles northeast of Raton is the world famous Folsom site where stone points were found with bones of extinct *Bison antiquus* demonstrating for the first time the presence of man in North America during the Pleistocene. The bones were later dated to 10,500 years before present (BP) by carbon 14 analysis. The site is located on New Mexico Trust land about 10 miles west of Folsom. Dave Ferro, Marilyn and I were fortunate to tour the site on August 17. Native Americans, probable descendants of these Pleistocene hunters, have lived in New Mexico for 2500 years or longer. We will stop at the Folsom museum and have lunch there.

Travelers on the Mountain route of the Santa Fe Trail (1822-1880) came over Raton Pass to Raton (Willow Springs) and to Santa Fe. The Cimarron cutoff left the main trail near Garden City, Kansas and took a diagonal route past Clayton, NM to join the main route near Watrus, NM saving 10 days. There is evidence of significant volcanic activity in this area. Johnson Mesa which we will cross is capped by hundreds of feet of volcanic basalt. The Capulin Volcano National Monument is near Folsom where we will stop. At this time the road up the volcano is closed for repairs following a washout but the visitor's center is open. Many landmarks along the Santa Fe Trail such as Rabbit Ears Mountain near Clayton are volcanic remnants.

In Clayton, we will stay at the historic Eklund Hotel (1895). Clayton was in the dust bowl area and is now primarily a ranching and railroad community. We will drive over National Grasslands to a number of Santa Fe Trail crossings as well as a visit to a state park where there are beautifully preserved dinosaur tracks. There will be ample time to explore antique stores in both Raton and Clayton. We will have the opportunity to sport our vintage clothing both in Raton and Clayton and we plan a showing in a restored historic Luna theater in Clayton. During the depression, Raymond Huff Union Country Superintendent of Schools organized a 6000 person work force to build a new Clayton High School under the WPA. This project saved Union Country and today details of this endeavor are presented in the Herzstein museum. One can google "Dust Bowl in Clayton" for more information including PBS presentations.

Technical Issue Rebuilding the Model T Differential July 22, 2019 Paul Duncan

This is a labor intensive project and it does tie up the lift in Larry's garage. One should consider preordering all replacement parts including a new drive shaft and new axles. Larry has accumulated a number of very useable "used" axle bearings with the proper grease groves. Larry has a number of "used" gear cases which might be less worn than what one finds in their own differential being rebuilt. Lang's does have new old stock right sided gear cases in their catalogue. Larry has added two 1/16 "longer axles, a new drive shaft and a new old stock right sided differential gear casing to stock.

Paul, Marilyn and Larry completed the rebuilding of their 1920 differential in nine days of "lift time" with help from other Tin Lizzie members. Five days was spent in delays to order a new drive shaft. When planning to rebuild a differential, talk with Larry and get a complete parts list from him. I recommend new axles and a new driveshaft which will save a lot of time and headache. I also found that the 3 part T tips DVD set with Fred Houston a big help. The DVD set is in the Tin Lizzie library overseen by Mark Dominquez.

"A Trail and Two Rails For Santa Fe"

Plan to arrive Raton NM on September 18th in the early afternoon. Raton is approximately 230 miles from Albuquerque (around 3 hours and 30 minutes driving time).

Tour Headquarters in Raton: Best Western Plus on US 64 (473 Clayton Road) 1(575) 445-8501

Group Rate: \$132/night

Alternative accommodations in the immediate vicinity: Quality Inn (next door) \$104.50 1(575) 445-4200, Casa Lemus Inn and Restaurant (across the highway) \$70 king and \$79 two queens 1(575) 445-4024. All three establishments have adequate trailer parking. A Microtel and Motel 8 are also near. For RVers, the Willow Springs RV Park is a couple of blocks away at 1025 Frontage Road 1(575) 445-1200.

2019 Montana 500 Columbus MT (continuation) by Kirk

Saturday night while having dinner at the 307 Bar Grill and Casino, I was volunteered to enter the 500 mile endurance run timesheets into an Excel spreadsheet. My total experience with Excel consisted of attending a one day class in the shopping center across the street from Cliff's in Albuquerque over 20 years ago. I knew it was going to be an exciting 4 days ahead of me.

On Sunday, I rode with Gene in his 500 Race car. We made a test run on I 90 reaching speeds of 57 mph, which I did not think was too bad considering it was a "Stock" Model T. In the afternoon the race officials inspected the 25 entries and wire sealed bolts on various engine components.

I had the pleasure of riding in the backseat of a Tundra Pickup for two and one half days for a total of 495 miles. During the 9 legs of the race, I entered a total of 20 timesheets containing leaving and arrival times into Excel for the 25 race entrants. On several occasions, I would stand behind the Tundra waving a checkered flag signaling the drivers they had finished the particular leg.

Women in Military Service for The American Memorial (UNK)

Note

Mary Edwards Walker. (1832-1919) Civil War Surgeon. Born into a progressive farming family in Oswego, New York, Mary Edwards Walker was one of the first women to take advantage of Syracuse Medical College's willingness in the middle of the nineteenth century to admit women on November 11, 1865, President Johnson signed a bill to present Dr. Mary Edwards Walker with the Congressional Medal of Honor for

Meritorious Service, in order to recognize her contributions to the war effort without awarding her an army commission! She is buried in Arlington National Cemetery

Six Model Ts participated on this day – the Duncan's drove their recently restored 1927 Model T pickup truck, the Azevedo's came in their 1912 touring car, Mark Dominguez drove his 1927 touring car and his wife Sharon pulled a flatbed truck with the family's 1923 runabout, Dave Ferro made the trip in his 1918 depot hack and local Belen resident Steve Langdon arrived at the museum in his 1926 Model T coupe.

The participants met at the Isleta Casino and Resort and "paraded" to Belen – a driving distance of approximately 25 miles that took about an hour via Model T. The route followed the Rio Grande so the terrain was almost flat. We drove through Albuquerque's South Valley, Isleta Pueblo, Bosque Farms, Los Lunas and Tome. The weather was very warm with the temperature reaching the upper 90's.

Belen is home to approximately 7,200 residents and has been getting international exposure recently as the location of artist Judy Chicago's "Through the Flower Art Space" gallery, learning center, and store which had it's grand opening on the 20th. The two buildings are less than a block apart and we met several people from out-of-town who came for the opening and were delighted to visit the Harvey House Museum and see our cars as well.

The Belen Harvey House was built in 1910 and operated until 1939. It was one of the Fred Harvey Company chain of restaurants and hotels. Fred Harvey (1835 - 1901) was born in England and was intelligent, ambitious and innovative. He worked his way up from a dishwasher to (at the time of his death in 1901) owning 47 restaurants, 15 hotels and 30 dining cars along the Atchison, Topeka & Santa Fe Railroad railway routes. The women who staffed the restaurants and hotels were called "Harvey Girls" and were between 18 and 30 years of age. These women were under strict codes of conduct and in the case of the Belen Harvey House, lived dormitory-style on the second floor. Their reputation was for outstanding customer service and high standards.. The Belen Harvey House was spared from demolition (many of the hotels and restaurants in the chain are now long gone) and is now a branch of the Belen Public Library specializing in railroad and southwest history.

The day was spent visiting the excellent museum, talking to visitors about our cars and enjoying the picnic lunch of hotdogs, chips, and lemonade provided by the museum staff. Around 3pm, the Tin Lizzies began the hour long drive north in the hope of beating the late afternoon monsoonal rains. It was a great day in Belen and scenic drive in the green belt along the Rio Grande.

Thank you to our hosts – Frances Zeller and the staff at the Belen Harvey House Museum and to our event organizers – Paul and Marilyn Duncan and Dave Ferro!
