President's Message

Driving and maintaining a Model T takes diligence, attention to detail and mechanical expertise. On the recent Las Vegas, NM tour we drove our T's 250 miles. Club members brought 6 T's to the event and 3 had mechanical troubles. One arrived needing immediate attention and was helped by attaching an auxiliary spring to the low band clutch pedal. Another, started off the first tour driving day but soon experienced overheating and backfiring. Both the T and the driver rode the trouble trailer the rest of the day. After returning to the trailer parking lot, the "resuscitation team" appeared and went to work to fix a timer issue and improve the radiator cooling. The T returned to the road the next day cruising around town and completed the final tour day with a brisk wind helping to cool the radiator. The driver of another T noticed he was running on only 3 cylinders. First the diagnosis team replaced the offending coil with an ECCT-tested one borrowed from another participant. The T ran fine. Then, the driver noticed that the nuts holding the points on the malfunctioning coil were loose. After Larry tightened the nuts, the coil functioned again. But, the coils were then shorting out on the coil box cover, so the driver left it off for the rest of the tour.

In Albuquerque we all benefit from Larry Azevedo's expertise and his shop in Corrales. We know from prior tours that there are Model T's parked in garages in Raton, Clayton, Socorro, Las Vegas, Las Cruces, El Paso, Portales and Santa Fe. Some of these T's run and some of them likely will run after expert mechanical attention. On Saturday of the Tour in Las Vegas. I started the 1925 T Roadster in new member Jimmy Ortiz's collection of vintage cars. The T's engine ran very smoothly. We didn't drive it outside the garage that day since the tires needed more air. Jimmy didn't think it had run for a number of years but he has kept the battery charged. He was happy to know that it could run but he was not ready to drive it yet. He had bought it several years ago for his collection because he liked having a Model T but not necessarily to drive a Model T.

Our Club is a regional resource of Model T knowledge and mechanical expertise. Long time Tin Lizzie member Larry Azevedo is a true Model T expert with decades of Model T experience. Over the past 10 years, he has graciously shared his expertise with many Club members. He has opened his Corrales shop for our use on work days. The Club membership, however, continues to grow but he has limited time. He can not attend to every Model T problem. A number of us in the Club have our own garages where we work on maintaining and restoring our Model Ts. We can be a resource for others in the Club to answer questions and help solve problems.

I suggest we consider forming within our Club a core group of members who are willing to assist other members who have mechanical issues with their T's. Some of these can be solved by a home visit to evaluate the T in question. We are all "Model T mechanics" in training. There is no better teaching exercise than analyzing a poorly running engine. identifying a potential problem and then fixing the problem. Not solving the problem then leads to consultation with Larry or another Club member for help.

Please give me some feedback on this topic.

Tin Lizzie Fall Tour, "Following the Santa Fe Trail", Las Vegas, NM (09/22-26/21)

The Tin Lizzie Fall Tour this year was based in Las Vegas, NM and featured 3 days of driving in the region. Tour coordinators this year were Paul & Marilyn Duncan and Dave Ferro. The Tour focused on the historical importance of the Las Vegas region during Spanish, Mexican and U.S. occupation. The Bicentennial of the Santa Fe Trail is being celebrated during 2021. traditional Spanish Colonial style with a central plaza. The town became a prosperous stop on the Santa Fe Trail (1821-1880) and currently has many structures listed on the National Registry of Historic buildings. The historic Plaza Hotel was built in 1881 on the Plaza of West Las Vegas. The recentlyrenovated hotel was our base for our Tour. Despite ongoing construction around the Plaza, we were able to display our Model T's for residents who regularly

Neidigk 1926 Coupe (Almost) Completed

Neidigk Restoration

Don Neidigk drove his 1926 Coupe to **Larry Azevedo's** shop in Corrales on August 8, 2020 and we pulled his engine. Mark Wing, Dave

Ferro, Don and Paul Duncan assisted. Paul then trailered Don's T (minus the engine) back to his home on the west side of Albuaueraue.

During the next vear during the COVID shutdown, Don continued to slowly work on rebuilding the engine, driveline and the rear differential. By April 2021, he finally completed assembly of the engine hogs head.

In early June 2021, Paul picked up Don's '26 coupe again from his home garage and brought it back to Larry's shop. After

removing the body bolts we picked up the body on the lift and rolled the chassis out from under the body. Larry power washed the chassis.

Then, as time would allow, Don, with the help of many of us who were there on Tuesday work days gradually worked through many of the parts on the chassis that needed cleaning, replacement and painting. Don took the wheels home where he removed old black paint from the spokes and refinished them as natural wood. Don and Dave worked on the torque tube in early August, 2021.

All of August and into early September, 2021 we worked on finishing the engine rebuild as well as a complete restoration of the rear differential. (Larry currently recommends replacing the drive shaft along with a new ring and pinion gear along with new axles when rebuilding the rear end.)

The Coupe body had several areas of major rust damage. Larry, Dave, and Don replaced several areas of sheet metal that had rusted through on the body. Rectangular pieces of sheet metal were flanged and spot-welded into place. The underside of the body was also very rusty but otherwise solid. Paul wire-brushed the area and then **Marilyn Duncan** encapsulated it with an Eastwood product. Don and his grandson Ben who is also a Tin Lizzie member mounted the front wheels back on the chassis with assistance

from **Kirk Peterson**. Next, we added a new oak board across the body to secure both the body bolts and bolts for Ben's seat belt brackets.

> Finally, Larry, Paul, Don and Dave carefully guided the coupe body from the lift to the chassis and secured the body bolts.

Finally, a little more than a year after starting the Coupe restoration, September 14, 2021 would be the day to start the T. The group went to work on assembling the final nuts and bolts, water hoses and clamps, steering assembly, throttle and carburetor, spark advance and hook up the battery. At 3 pm we were readv to attempt a start.

The engine was very tight and the 6V battery did not have enough torque to start the engine. We attached the steering wheel, pushed the T out of the garage and hooked it up to Lorna Azevedo's Jeep. Larry drove the T and Paul drove the Jeep with a tow strap hooked to the T.

The T still did not start. Next, we drained the old gas and put in 3 gallons of new gas. Also, we changed out the original carburetor for a newlyrebuilt Holley NH. Then we all returned to the soccer field. Success! The engine finally started and sounded "balanced." Then, we returned to the shop and lifted the rear of the T with Larry's vintage jack. There were no leaks of either water or oil! Don was elated. Larry was relieved to know the engine ran and he has now started the engine with the starter. Don will soon drive the T home to his garage. We all anticipate that **Ben** will continue to help his grandfather during the final assembly of the Neidigk family T!

Wing's 1909 Model T Project Update

1909 Tourabout

In the last edition of the newsletter, I recounted how I came to acquire a 1909 Model T project car (engine 8143). Since then, I received documentation from the Benson Ford Research Center confirming that it left the Ford Piquette factory on August 2, 1909 as a

Tourabout. A Tourabout is like a runabout of that year but instead of having a "mother-in-law" single rear seat it has a rear seat like the front with no opening doors. **Tourabouts** were introduced for Ford's 1910 model year which officially began on August 1, 1909. Initially, there was no place on the manufacturing and shipping forms under

"type" for this new body style, so in both cases the word

"Tourabout" was penciled in at the top. These microfiche documents are very hard to read and the staff at the Benson Ford Research Center try their best to interpret them for you. For a modest \$35 research fee, there is a wealth of information on these documents for anyone wanting to do an accurate restoration of a 1909 through mid-1911 Model T.

When I acquired this project, it came with an original 1909/10 touring body plus a reproduction one. It was advertised to be a Ray Wells "the Craftsman" (El Cajon, CA) reproduction body. After talking to Ray, it is probably the creation of his predecessor, a

master researcher and woodworker named Bob Marks from whom Ray purchased all his templates approximately 40 years ago.

realized that to do this early Model T project justice, I should return it to the body-type that it had when it left the factory. I ordered a new Tourabout body from Ray and in around 5 weeks. he had it ready for pick up. The quick turnaround was due to Ray having all the wood on hand and the fact that this body style doesn't require the fabrication of hinges or door handles. I provided Ray with the 6 body to frame brackets, so the project was easy for him relative to the range of bodies in Ray's catalogue. At 82 years old, Ray remains the

"go to" guy if you want an accurate and beautifully built early Model T wood body. This body is among the lightest Model T body styles and fit easily in my pickup truck bed. It is now housed in my garage awaiting a trip to my recently-acquired warehouse/office space near the I-25 frontage road and Tramway.
