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Using Model T's to Teach Students

Cover Story, Part 1

During the 2024-2025 school year, Tin Lizzies Club members have used our Model T's to help educate both teachers and students in four Albuquerque area highs schools. Henry Ford and his Model T automobiles were an important force during the first 25 years of the 20th century. By sharing both our knowledge of Henry Ford history and our Model T's we hope to stimulate both teachers and students to discover new ways to

understand that period of U.S. history.

In November, 2024, five Tin Lizzie Club members. Mark & Susan Wing, Paul & Marilyn Duncan, Larry Azevedo and Dave **Ferro** drove 4 Model T's to Sandia Prep School in Albuquerque for a second vear. This year, we spent time in the classroom with students who were taking a combined American history and English class. Their assignment was to read and discuss a 1936 essay written by the

American writer E.B.

White (1899-1985.) White's essay, Farewell My Lovely! was originally published in The New Yorker magazine. In his essay about the Model T, he describes the Model T transmission. "The model T was distinguished from other makes of cars by the fact that its transmission was a type known as planetary-which was half metaphysics, half sheer friction." Following questions and discussion in the classroom, we took the students outside to see and ride in "real" Model T's. They were thrilled to hear the sound of the engine and see the levers and pedals. We gave the students rides on the road behind the school. During the classroom discussions, the students learned about changes in American life that were a direct result of the automobile. These students are currently living in a very different time with personal cell phones, super computers and evolving artificial intelligence. Although almost all of the kids drive cars to school but only one boy had ever driven a "stick" shift vehicle and no one had ridden in a Model T before our visit.

In March, 2025, our Tin Lizzies Model T Club along with members of Poco Quatros Model A Club

participated again in the Great Gatsby Day at Sandia High School in Albuquerque. Teachers at the school have had a combined American History and English class open to juniors and seniors. They celebrate a "Great Gatsby Day" as part of the curriculum. The students read the 1925 F. Scott Fitzgerald novel, *The Great Gatsby* and discuss the life-style and events of the 1920's. They dress up in period clothes and represent people of the era. We bring

our cars and give rides to the students and staff. Following the car show, there is a "Roaring Twenties" lunch inside the school. This year Tin Lizzie members Mark Wing, Paul Beck and Iohn & Vicki Lujan-Gibbs participated. The Cover Picture for this issue shows Paul Beck with a load of smiling students enjoying their ride in his 1918 TT.

In February, 2025, several Club members attended the annual Valencia High School

(VHS) Auto Shop Car Show in Los Lunas, NM. Larry Azevedo and Dave Ferro brought their T's, John Gibbs brought his Model A and Angel Peña brought his Jeep.

In addition since late 2019, the Club has been involved with an ongoing Model T Auto Shop project at VHS. During that time, we have had numerous interruptions and delays. First, there was COVID-19 that disrupted the school schedule over several years. Also, the school is located more than an hour drive from Albuquerque and lacks many of the usual Model T tools. A small group of Club members has volunteered to travel and work on the Model T project at the school including Paul & Marilyn Duncan, Dave Ferro, Tim Heer and Sean Hughes. Finally, however it became apparent, that the ONLY way that we were going to get the Model T started was to bring both the car and the students into Larry's Shop in Corrales.

Valencia Auto Students Visit Larry's Shop

Cover Story, Part 2

On April 3, 2025, seven Valencia High School (VHS) Auto Shop students came to Larry **Azevedo's** shop with their teacher **Anthony** Chavez for a "workday" on their '27 Touring. Students attending were Vincent, Kristopher,

Dustin, Kathryn, Emmitt, Rosalyn and Audrey. In 2019, a different group of VHS auto shop students had come to the Corrales shop but worked on another Club member's T. The students who came recently, however were there to work on their '27 Model T!

The T was originally donated to the school by Tin Lizzie **Tom Miles** and included a body, rebuilt engine and transmission and other assorted parts. Other Club members donated various spare parts and some cash to buy several new parts. After several years of working on the T at the school, however, we finally concluded that we had to bring the T in to Larry's Shop in Corrales. There we had access to Model T tools, spare parts and Larry's expertise.

In early March, 2025, we drove to VHS with our trailer to pick up the T and accumulated parts. We

visit the Shop.

brought the T to Larry's Corrales Shop. Over several days Larry and Paul organized parts into groups: electrical, carburetor, radiator, manifold, exhaust and steering. We lifted the body off the frame to attach the running boards. Larry found two cross-frame running board supports among his parts that we wire-brushed, painted and hotriveted to the frame. Dave Ferro and Kirk **Peterson** assisted bolting the body back to the frame with new wood body blocks. We also fixed two flat tires with new tubes and flaps donated by Larry. FINALLY, we were ready for the students to

The teacher arrived at 9 a.m. sharp with his Auto Shop students. Tin Lizzie Club members who came to assist the students in addition to Larry, included Mark Wing, Paul & Marilyn Duncan, Jeff Richards, Scott Stuart, Tim O'Brien, John

> Criswell, Frank Lewark and Leonard Scarborough.

First, Larry orientated the students to his Model T shop. In advance, he had written out specific work plans for the student teams to follow. Each student team was assigned to a Tin Lizzie Club member. The tasks included fitting and installing the steering box and timer and installing the fan and radiator. Brake rods were installed and adjusted. The exhaust manifold was checked and found to be straight. The carburetor was valve adjusted. The students were in the shop for about 3 hours and accomplished almost all of the planned tasks.

Since then, several Club members have continued to work hooking up everything that was needed to get the Model T started. Over the years of this project, we have learned a lot about the limitations of working with students in a shop class room that is not set up to work on Model T's.

We have had many different projects at Larry's shop this past month. I have been very involved with the Valencia High School 1927

Model T Touring project. There had been a lot of progress in the restoration project in the Valencia High School Auto Shop. however, to get the engine running, we had to move the T in to Larry's shop. The Cover Story-Part 2 on page 4 describes the April 3rd Shop Day that we had with 7 students and their teacher, Anthony Chavez. We made a lot of progress in that 3-hour session because of the advance

preparation by Larry and other Tin Lizzie members.

A week after the student visit, Larry and I finished getting the T ready to start. The

sediment bowl and shut-off for the 1926-27 cowl gas tank leaked gas. Larry found a modern but similar fuel bowl with shut-off that we installed.

Larry also loaned the T a 6-volt battery and 4 of his "tuned coils." I sat up in the T to run the key and starter switches and the spark advance. Larry stood by at the carburetor. I hit START and the Model T STARTED! We identified that the generator was not generating and the exhaust manifold was leaking. There are several more projects for the students to

work on before the T can return to their Shop. We are currently planning another work day for them in Corrales.

Model T Accessories

Accessories

Henry Ford produced and sold a solidlyengineered Model T automobile that the public of the era wanted to buy and was affordable. He understood that roads at the time required an automobile needed to be light weight, have with a flexible suspension and be easily repairable.

In 1908, when Ford Motor Company (FMC) introduced their Model T, it was not a "perfect" automobile but was, in Henry's mind, an ideal enough design to start major production. He knew that the American men who were the primary drivers of automobiles at that time. would be able to learn most adjustments and to carry out many repairs, if parts were available. He also knew that there were plenty of other entrepreneurs who could and would offer "improvements" for his basic Model T. At that time, approximately half of the people in the U.S. lived in small rural towns or on a farm. These Americans needed a reliable automobile that they could afford. In his book, Henry Ford and Grass-roots America, the author Reynold Wik comments that "A farmer near Berea. Ohio. writing Edsel Ford in 1938, recalled that Henry Ford had done more than any

man who had ever lived to free farm families from monotony and isolation." Floyd Clymer estimates in his book "Henry's Wonderful Model T (1908-1927), that there were at least 5,000 accessories developed and sold for the Model T. In reading through his Chapter 7, "5,000 Accessories," one of the ads (1922) labeled "Broken Arms Prevented from Ford Cranking" caught our attention. The "Non-Kick" device "automatically disengages the clutch, allowing the motor to reverse without injury to yourself or car." The ad claims that only 30% of 1,290,000 Ford cars manufactured in 1921 were

sold with starters. Also, that statistics show "thousands are hurt each month cranking their Ford." The price of the "Non-Kick" device was originally \$4 but was being advertised at a NEW REDUCED PRICE of 2.50 postpaid. The inventors were certainly aware that in 1919, FMC had

introduced an electric starter as a Model T option, however, many buyers opted not to spend the additional \$50 for a starter car.


The Ruckstell axle was by far one of the most popular and successful of the Model T accessory items. Glover Ruckstell (1891-1963) was an automotive engineer, race car driver and airplane pilot. Following service in WWI, he became re-interested in a two-speed rear axle and perfected an earlier design. During the 1920's, he acquired the rights to manufacture the original Perfecto Axle and the name was later changed to the "Ruckstell Axle." Tin Lizzie **Don Neidigk** recently finished installing a Ruckstell axle his 1927 Coupe, Arty. See story on page 8 of this issue. Tin Lizzies Frank Lewark and Leonard **Scarborough** are also currently rebuilding a Ruckstell for Leonard's 1923 Tudor Sedan.

Although Henry Ford rarely commented on Model T accessories, he apparently "approved" of the Ruckstell Axle. By the late 1920's Ruckstell Axles were included in the Ford Parts Catalog and sold through Ford dealerships.

For Model T drivers, the Ruckstell adds a 2-speed rear axle that gives the Model T more power at a lower speed and avoids long stretches of holding down the Low Band pedal when climbing hills like we have in New Mexico.

Arty's has New Rear End!

Editor's Note: Don is a semi-retired minister and regular Columnist for the Tin Lizzie newsletter where he shares stories about his 1927 Model T coupe Arty.

If you're like me, you probably read Mark Twain's Adventures of Tom Sawyer in school. Remember when Aunt Polly makes Tom whitewash a wooden fence as punishment for playing hooky? While he is slopping whitewash on

the fence, one friend after another comes by to tease him, but Tom turns the table on them. Soon, his friends are begging to help whitewash and even offer to pay him for the privilege! By the end of the day, the fence has 3 coats of whitewash and Tom has a pile of treasures while doing very little of the whitewashing himself.

This is a similar story to how I got a rebuilt Ruckstell in Arty, my 1927 Model T Ford Coupe. I had spent hours reading about Model T Ruckstell axles and watching YouTube videos on how to rebuild one. I was convinced that this would take MONTHS of hard dirty labor. I wondered how I would get the original axle out of Arty and

take it to Larry Azevedo's shop in Corrales. Normally, I would have just driven the T but Arty's timer was having trouble.

Larry solved my problem by bringing his trailer to my house. He drove Arty onto the trailer and hauled Arty to his shop. When the next Club Work Day arrived, I was there asking Larry a few questions on where to begin. Before I could even find the right wrench, half a dozen Tin Lizzie Club members descended on Arty: removing his rear wheels, compressing his rear leaf spring, disconnecting his drive shaft, the Rocky Mountain brakes and anything else that needed undoing. By the end of the first Work Day, the old axle was out, partially disassembled and the "used" Ruckstell had all its parts cleaned and measured. We were able to rebuild the "used" Ruckstell using "good but old" parts and a couple of new ones.

A few weeks later when it was time to install the completely-rebuilt Ruckstell back into Arty, the Club volunteers reappeared. Altogether, there were about 4 days of work getting Arty back on

the road, not the months and months I had envisioned! After everything was installed, I got a lesson from Larry on how to shift the Ruckstell. With Arty running in the shop, Larry put the Ruckstell through its 4-forward and the 2-reverse gears. It worked flawlessly. Then I realized that

we had a problem. There was VERY little room for the driver's legs and thighs. I have LONG legs and REALLY big feet. I could squeeze myself in and operate the shifter but my son Nathan, who shares my interest in Model T's, is a REALLY BIG man. There's no way he could drive Arty with a long Rucksell shifter.

Several years ago, my Grandson **Ben** and I had driven Larry's Model T truck in the Corrales 4th of July parade. Larry had pointed out the floor-

kick-shifter his father had rigged up for the truck's Ruckstell. It worked like a foot-activated toggle and eliminated the long-handled gear shifter. I asked Larry whether this might work for

Arty? He said he'd think about it and the next Saturday I showed up at Larry's shop for a Work Day. A new kick-shifter had been installed in Arty. By the time Arty was ready to go home with his new Ruckstell and kick-shifter, two of my sons, Stephen and Nathan, two grandsons, Ben and James and granddaughter, Elly, had all gotten to turn a wrench, screw on a hubcap and get their fingers greasy. Not only was this a Tin Lizzie's Club project but a Neidigk Family one as well. Tom Sawyer would have been proud of me.

Tin Lizzie members who helped included the following: Dave Ferro, Angel & Lucien Peña, Kirk Petersen, Jeff Richards and especially Larry Azevedo.

Meanwhile, Arty has a new timer and I am practicing out how to shift the Ruckstell in my hilly westside neighborhood and am dreaming of maybe even driving Arty to Taos this summer.

Our Tin Lizzie Club newsletter, *The Enchantment Flyer* was recently recognized with a prestigious Golden Quill award for 2024. Golden Quill Recognition Awards are awarded each year to recognize and honor outstanding collector car hobby publications and editors for Excellence.

This is the second year in a row that our Club newsletter has been selected for this award from the *Old Cars Weekly* judges. As in the past, the Model T Ford Club of America's magazine, *The Vintage Ford* won an award in the "National Luxury" category with editor Aleesa Drennan. Our *Enchantment Flyer newsletter* was recognized as one of 25 winners in the

"Economy-Size Regions & Chapter Category."
There was only one other Model T Club (Greater Milwaukee) among those winners that also included publications dealing with Studebakers, Corvairs, Pontiacs, Cadillacs, Oldsmobiles, Hudsons and Packards.
